E rebids at the 4 level to show a basic opener which $W$ who has a flat hand is happy to pass. |  |
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| W should lead AH ... asking for attitude. E should play the 6 saying no p, I do not have a shortage and I do not hold the Q. then switches to a trump to defeat the contract. How do you pick 6 H as E's highest? A couple of clues: which ones can you see that are missing? why did declarer NOT play the 2? Tip for declarers - the 2 is a very telling card. You should think twice before showing that you have it. | W reverses, bidding $C$ first and then bidding beyond his opening suit, beyond 2C by bidding 2D. This promises 16 plus HCP. Once E explains his hand by showing a repeat in Hs $W$ puts $E$ back to the first bid suit in case it is a 6 card suit. NTs in a misfit is rarely a good option as transport between hands becomes problematic. |

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| South is able to splinter on the way to game. With the recalculation by $N$ after the splinter, and falling short of $26 \mathrm{TP}, \mathrm{N}$ stops in game. | W makes an immediate raise to game anxious to cut out further interference by the opposition. $N$ bids 4Ss easily at this vulnerability. $E$ is in difficulties doubling with his spade holding. W should X giving $p$ option of penalties or bidding 5 H . In fact 5 H does not make on this hand but 4SX goes 3 light and is a steal for the NS pair bidding according to LTT |
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| N uses Aussie Bergen to explain 3 card H support and 10 to 12 HCP. With this information $S$ decides with shape there is enough to go to straight to game. | E uses Puppet Stayman and receives the reply 3NT, no 5 card major, no 4 card major, max points. E takes the safer line of moving the partnership into 5D. The lucky slam of 6D should not be bid as it relies on two successful finesses. |

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
